Flinders University Research donation

AVA has donated a state-of-the-art freezer to Associate Professor Sonja Klebe and her team at Flinders Medical Centre. Dr Klebe has developed a 'tumor in a dish' model that uses tumor cells to seek out new treatments for asbestos-related diseases.

This unique model enables the researchers to test different treatments in the laboratory and compare their results with how patients respond in real clinical settings. But to accomplish these ambitious goals, multiple cell samples from the same patient need to be stored at exceptionally cold temperatures. The freezer will store valuable tumor cells at minus 80 degrees - this capability is invaluable for the research process because normal freezers operate at only minus 20 degrees.

The freezer will be used by the laboratory team led by Flinders University researcher and Associate Professor in Pathology, Sonja Klebe who says each



case of mesothelioma has its own unique genetic challenges, and it's difficult to predict how a patient will respond to treatment.

"Our unique model tests potential treatments *in vitro*, correlating the findings with actual clinical responses, which enables us to mimic tumor progression and resistance development by closely mimicking the host tumour and its environment, including immune cells and stroma," says Professor Klebe.

"It's important we undertake this testing effectively because while a new type of immunotherapy can help improve symptoms for some patients, it can also cause significant side effects for others. Each case of mesothelioma has its own unique genetic challenges, and it's difficult to predict how a patient will respond to treatment. This donation of high-quality freezing equipment is an invaluable asset and will ensure we can continue to develop therapies that can transform our approach to effective treatment."

International Workers Memorial Day Pilgrim Church

The Specialist Mesothelioma Learning Module by ADDRI

The Specialist Mesothelioma Learning Module by ADDRI is an e-learning resource designed to increase awareness and understanding among nurses and allied health professionals about the different types of mesothelioma, its presentation, and how to provide optimal care throughout the disease cycle. The module covers topics such as the history of asbestos use in Australia, how asbestos exposure occurs and who is at risk, the types and histopathology of mesothelioma, and the presentation and diagnosis of patients with pleural mesothelioma.

Clinical trial shows tumour-starving drug improves survival of mesothelioma

A clinical trial has shown that a tumour-starving drug can improve the survival of mesothelioma patients. The trial was conducted by researchers at Queen Mary University of London and involved the use of a drug called CB-839. The drug works by blocking the production of glutamine, which is essential for the growth of cancer cells. The trial showed that CB-839 in combination with chemotherapy drugs pemetrexed and cisplatin was an active and safe combination for front-line treatment of unresectable malignant pleural mesothelioma. The trial also showed encouraging overall survival results with no increase in systemic toxicity.

This is good news for patients with malignant pleural mesothelioma, which is an aggressive cancer that affects the lining of the lungs and is associated with exposure to asbestos. It has a five-year survival rate of less than 10%.
