### NATIONAL SILICOSIS PREVENTION **STRATEGY**

Silicosis has been much in the news lately and is being described as 'the new asbestos'. The current trend for manufactured stone in kitchen countertops is one of the reasons the disease has become so prevalent.

Crystalline silica is a natural mineral found in construction materials such as concrete, tiles and engineered stone. It is particularly dangerous for workers because it can contain high levels of silica.



When ground, cut, drilled or sanded, inhaling the dust can cause deadly lung and respiratory diseases such as silicosis. Silicosis is treatable but not curable – it is a life limiting disease, often affecting younger tradies who work in the construction industry.


### **National Dust Diseases Task Force**

The National Dust Diseases Task Force reported in July 2021 that almost a quarter of the workers working with engineered stone since before 2018 were suffering from silicosis. It found that existing WHS laws had failed to protect workers, citing inadequate control of dust exposure, ineffective health monitoring and insufficient enforcement of existing laws by WHS regulators. A ban on silica products is recommended by July 2024 if the product could not be found to be used safely. The CMFEU is calling for an immediate ban on engineered stone.

### National Silicosis Prevention Strategy (NSPS) & National Action Plan (NAP)

This will be the first national action plan designed to prevent and ultimately eliminate silicosis as an occupational disease in Australia. Both the NSPS and the NAP outline a coordinated national approach to silicosis prevention that involves government, National Employers' and Workers' organisations.

Workplace health and safety ministers and key industry groups from across the country met in February to discuss whether a tougher approach is needed. Health Minister Mark Butler said an import ban was "obviously an option that will be considered".

### **Asbestos Dangers - Flood recovery in the Riverland**

Communities in the Riverland have struggled through a slow-moving disaster, watching the progress of the floods along the river and waiting to see whether their properties would be affected. Many properties were inundated – shacks, businesses, caravan parks, homes and crops were lost. People had to find somewhere else to live in the short term.

Now the water has receded, and the clean-up can start. Many have to make hard decisions – how bad is the damage? Is the property salvageable? Can it be rebuilt/repaired? Is it safe to rebuild in the same spot? An important part of decision making will be the insurance assessor's report so people can find out what their financial situation is. Once the decision is made to stay or go, the next thing will be trying to get hold of tradies to do the work.

### River Murray residents, shack owners and emergency response crews are being warned of the dangers of handling asbestos when flood waters subside.



SafeWork SA advises that undamaged asbestos-containing material that has dried since the flood or storm can be cleaned with soapy water and a cloth or sponge. It is also safe to lightly scrub the material with a soft brush or broom and spray it gently with a garden hose. It is <a href="important to not use a high-pressure hose">important to not use a high-pressure hose</a> as this may break the surface and release asbestos fibres into the air, which are then breathed in.

People cleaning-up after the flood or undertaking any repairs, renovation or demolition work are being urged to become familiar with the type of products that may contain asbestos and where to find them. The South Australian Government asbestos website has a page to help identify asbestos in the home.

Asbestos materials that are beyond cleaning, will require removal by a <u>licensed asbestos removalist</u> to reduce the risk of exposure during removal. A licensed asbestos removalist will have the relevant training and equipment to safely remove the asbestos from your home.

By law, asbestos waste must be taken to a licensed transfer stations or waste depots. It is recommended that you contact your local transfer station or waste depot for advice. Go to the EPAs <u>Wastes containing asbestos – removal, transport and disposal</u> for a list of licensed waste facilities.

### **Asbestos and Insurance**

Disaster events such as house fire, bushfire, floods, storms and cyclones occur regularly in Australia.

Cleaning up after a disaster event is significantly more dangerous and more expensive for properties where asbestos is present, and you may find that your insurance doesn't provide the cover you need.

You can lower your risk of accidental damage and uninsured costs if you check and plan for the presence of asbestos before disaster strikes and, if possible, have it safely removed.

#### Is your insurance policy asbestos ready?

Insurance policies may have exclusions for asbestos, or the level of coverage under a policy may not be enough to cover your actual expenses if asbestos materials are accidentally damaged or disturbed.

There is also a requirement for policy holders to take all reasonable precautions to manage any risk to their property and to declare any potential risks – such as the presence of asbestos – to the insurer when taking out an insurance policy. While you still have asbestos in your property, speak to your insurer and make sure you understand what asbestos-related incidents are covered under your insurance policies.
